WHH in South Sudan


OVERVIEW

In 2022, despite challenges posed by massive flooding, the persistence of violent clashes, and a constrained funding environment in the country, WHH South Sudan assisted **over 774,000 people** (54% of whom were women) through **26 projects** implemented across **five States**.

With humanitarian needs growing exponentially, 85% of spending went into **humanitarian assistance** projects. WHH partnered with WFP to reach a record 300,000 people facing dangerous levels of food depri-

vation in Northern Bar el Ghazal and Unity States, via its General Food Distribution, School Feeding interventions, and Agribusiness projects.

The continued support from the German Federal Foreign Government, through BMZ, GiZ and AA funding, boosted efforts towards **strengthening livelihoods and resilience** of the most vulnerable communities. These included both residents and Internally Displaced People (IDP), whose numbers saw a spike due to the ongoing floodings.





Welthungerhilfe (WHH) has been working in today's South Sudan since the late 1990s, implementing projects ranging from rapid disaster relief to sustainable development cooperation. Since the country's independence in 2011, WHH has implemented 87 projects with an overall volume of over EUR 420 million.

OVERCOMING EMERGENCIES

In 2022, the already **precarious humanitarian situation** in South Sudan has been deteriorating, worsened by recurrent climatic shocks (flooding and drought), violent clashes, disease outbreaks as well as humanitarian access constraints.

Due to the deepening crisis, the share of spending for the humanitarian sector in WHH portfolio has increased, reaching 85% in 2022. This allowed us to assist a record 300,000 people facing dangerous levels of food deprivation in some of the worst-affected areas, namely in Unity and Northern Bahr el Ghazal States where WHH has been active for several years.

The humanitarian funding covered a wide range of activities: cash distributions, food and non-food items (NFIs) distributions; support to school meals programmes; building shelters and installing sanitation facilities in camps hosting people displaced by recent floods.



AND BRINGING BACK STABILITY FOR THE FUTURE

WHH believes it is crucial to invest in people's capacities to **adapt and be resilient**, especially in a context of protracted, multi-layered crises like in South Sudan. Supporting people to achieve food security and create opportunities to earn a steady income brings back a sense of stability, which is the foundation to start building a future.

Throughout 2022, WHH continued working with progressive smallholder farmers to boost **local food production** and improve their access to food markets. Farmers learn about cultivation methods to improve their crops, receive seeds and agricultural tools as well as support with healthcare for their livestock. They also attend complementary training on **nutrition** and **hygiene** practices, later becoming trainers themselves within their communities.

People who are part of WHH projects can also join savings and credit groups (VSLA). After working and saving for several months, the members can receive individual loans to invest in their small businesses; once the loans are paid back, they continue to deposit savings. This method has proven to be effective especially for women, who represent more than half the members of such groups and whose income-earning opportunities are often limited by traditional norms.

Farming and running a business: the story of Abuk Aru Dut

Abuk Aru Dut is a 49 year-old woman living in Northern Bahr el Ghazal who attended agricultural practices training offered by WHH and joined a local VSLA group. As the head of the household, she takes care of her six children and her disabled husband.

With the training and tools received, Abuk was able to expand her cultivations from three feddans (an area equivalent to 4,200 m²) to a total of eight: she uses five for sorghum and three for groundnut. She also received a loan from her VSLA group, which she used to set up a small groundnut paste business. This combination of farming skills and additional income from her business is helping her to provide for her family. They can now afford to eat more than two meals per day, all her children got school uniforms and, whenever needed, Abuk can pay for healthcare services at a nearby clinic.
